AN ACT for fixing the Qualification of Jurors.

WHEREAS it is necessary to fix the qualification of Jurors—

BE IT THEREFORE ENACTED by His Excellency JOHN HINDMARSH, Knight of the Royal Hanoverian Guelphic Order, Governor and Commander-in-Chief of His Majesty's Province of South Australia, by and with the advice of the Legislative Council of the same, as follows, that is to say—

That no person shall be qualified to serve upon any Petty or Common Jury who is not above the age of twenty-one and under sixty years of age, and possessed of a real estate of the value of Fifty pounds, or of personal property of the value of One hundred pounds sterling. Age and property.
