## PREMIER LAUNCHES BOOK ON DRY-LAND FARMING.

The Premier, Mr. Dunstan, this week (Monday March 29) launched a new book produced by the Department of Agriculture on farming systems in South Australia.

The book, which is the only one in the world devoted to explaining dry land farming systems such as have been developed in South Australia, is expected to become a standard reference on dry land farming. The Department expects it to become a text book in agricultural colleges throughout Australia and many other parts of the world.

The 104 page book goes into detail on dry land farming in South Australia's cereal zone, pastoral zone and high rainfall zone. It outlines the climatic and soil similarities between the different regions of South Australia and overseas countries, particularly the Middle East.

The book illustrates methods of farming in each zone by showing the operations of one farmer in each area. They are Mr. K.A. Beare of Santawarra, Mr. B. Schinckle of Kybyolite in the South-East, and Mr. A.R. Radford who is a pastoralist with property 40 kilometers east of Burra.

Launching the book, the Premier said South Australia was able to market a complete dry land farming package to other countries with similar soil and climatic conditions. The very high level of agricultural and machinery expertise developed in the State came together as a natural export package, which with vigorous export promotion would mean very great financial benefit to South Australia.

Mr. Dunstan said many Middle East countries were very interested in South Australian farming techniques and many delegations from countries in the region had come to the State to look at our techniques and equipment.

"Often they come only to South Australia because they believe this State can provide all the resources they require", Mr. Dunstan said.

But Mr. Dunstan warned that South Australia could not afford to become complacent and must further develop its marketing and farming skills.

"There are other States and other countries that can provide similar information and would certainly like to cash in on the trade potential in the area.

"We must ensure that the lead we have established is maintained".

Mr. Dunstan said further promotion of South Australian dry land farming techniques would bring considerable benefit to companies in the private sector manufacturing farm machinery and goods. South Australia already had extensive trade links with some Middle East countries and the State's trade with Iraq alone was worth more than \$40 million a year.
