The Premier, Mr. Dunstan, today announced the members of the new Board of the South Australian Film Corporation.

They are : Mr. Jack Lee, Chairman; Mr. Irving Cook, Ms. Enid Peleska, Mr. John Morris and Mr. Bill Davies.

One board member will be a representative of the Corporation employees, and it is expected this new director will be chosen within the next two weeks.

Mr. Lee will be the Chairman of the Corporation and Mr. John Morris will be the new Director. Previously, the positions of Chairman and Director were held by one person, but amending legislation to the South Australian Film Corporation Act late last year split the two functions.

Mr. Lee was for many years one of the leading film directors of the United Kingdom and he has worked in Australia many times. He directed the film of Neville Shute's "A Town Like Alice" and directed "Robbery Under Arms", part of which was filmed in South Australia. He now lives in Sydney and in Australia has become very well known for his direction and production of documentaries and commercials.
