A booklet listing more than 250 research topics in areas of State Government administration has been produced by the Premier's Department.

The list is to help tertiary students and staff choose topics for theses and other research projects. The topics cover most disciplines, including Architecture and Town Planning, Economics, Law, Arts, Natural Sciences and Physical Sciences.

Announcing the publication of the booklet, the Premier, Mr. Dunstan, said it would be of great use to universities, colleges of advanced education and other educational institutions.

"There are many areas in which very important research can be done but which the State Government simply does not have the resources to investigate", Mr. Dunstan said.

"Until now there has been no guide to areas where research could usefully be done and for which the State Government's facilities are available.

"The Government feels the topics in the booklet will be of interest to tertiary researchers and that research on the suggested topics will yield benefits to the Government and the community.

"The list only suggests areas which have been identified by various government departments as needing further research. The Government has no intention of trying to direct research efforts. All approaches to government departments for advice on researcher's own topics will be given exactly the same help as any enquiry on a topic listed in the book".
