A petition of 590 signatures, protesting against the government's failure to build a new infants' school at Dankel avenue, Kensington, was presented last week to the Minister for Education (Mr. Pattinson).

The member for Norwood (Mr. D. A. Dunstan) presented the petition during the current session of Parliament.

The petition was prepared by the Marryatville Primary School committee.

Mr. Dunstan told "News-Review" the playing area at the Marryatville School was badly over-crowded, and the building of the proposed infant school was long overdue.

Urgent need of it had first been put to the Education Department by the school committee about three years ago, Mr. Dunstan said.

Buy land

It had been suggested then that the department buy land behind the existing school, and build the infant school there.

This suggestion was rejected on the grounds that the land was too expensive.

Instead, the department undertook to buy land at Dankel avenue, informed the committee by letter of this, with a warning that adjoining houses were likely to be demolished.

"Of course, I had something to say about the demolition of the houses," Mr. Dunstan said.

Patient

He said the position now, after three years of patient waiting by parents of the Kensington and Marryatville districts was that there was a fence around the land at Dankel avenue.
