WE HAVE ALWAYS LOOKED ON RESIDENTS OF THE SILVER CITY AS  
HONORARY SOUTH AUSTRALIANS.

WE TRADE AND DO BUSINESS WITH EACH OTHER AND EACH SUMMER WE LOOK  
FORWARD TO ONCE AGAIN PLAYING HOST TO BROKEN HILL WORKERS AND  
THEIR FAMILIES.

NEXT SEASON VISITORS FROM BROKEN HILL WILL BE ABLE TO EXPERIENCE  
SOME OF THE RESULTS OF OUR CONTINUING PROGRAMME TO BRIGHTEN UP  
SOUTH AUSTRALIA'S ATTRACTION FOR HOLIDAY-MAKERS.

OUR NEW FESTIVAL THEATRE AND PERFORMING ARTS CENTRE IN ADELAIDE  
IS GOING UP ON THE BANKS OF THE TORRENS: THERE WILL PROBABLY BE  
SIDEWALK LICENSED CAFES CATERING FOR VISITORS AND NUMBERS OF  
RESTAURANTS WILL STAY OPEN UNTIL 1.30 A.M.

SOUTH AUSTRALIA HAS ALWAYS VALUED THE 'ANNUAL MIGRATION' FROM  
BROKEN HILL AND WE ARE DETERMINED TO DO ALL WE CAN TO PROVIDE PROPER  
FACILITIES TO SEE IT CONTINUES.

THE LINKS BETWEEN US HAVE ALWAYS BEEN CLOSE AND CAN BE TRACED BACK  
TO THE ARRIVAL OF THE FIRST MINERS FROM SOUTH AUSTRALIA WHEN THE  
CITY WAS FOUNDED.

THIS HAS BEEN EXPANDED IN RECENT TIMES WITH THE DEVELOPMENT OF  
BUSINESS CONTACTS BETWEEN THE TWO CITIES, THROUGH SALES OF OUR  
PRODUCTS, AND THROUGH MINING RESEARCH.

ANOTHER EXAMPLE IS THE AFFILIATION OF 'THE BARRIER MINER' WITH  
'THE NEWS' IN ADELAIDE AND THE ANNUAL PRODUCTION OF THIS FEATURE.  
A SMALL CHANGE IN OUR STATE BOUNDARIES WOULD HAVE PUT BROKEN HILL  
FORMALLY INSIDE SOUTH AUSTRALIA.

BUT MOST OF US LOOK ON THE BOUNDARY AS A TECHNICAL DISTINCTION  
AND THAT THE PEOPLE OF BROKEN HILL ARE IMPORTANT AND VALUED FRIENDS  
AND PARTNERS IN THE DEVELOPMENT OF SOUTH AUSTRALIA.

We have always looked on residents of the Silver City as honorary South Australians.

We trade and do business with each other and each summer we look forward to once again playing host to Broken Hill workers and their families.

Next season visitors from Broken Hill will be able to experience some of the results of our continuing programme to brighten up South Australia's attraction for holiday-makers.

Our new Festival Theatre and performing arts centre in Adelaide is going up on the banks of the Torrens; there will probably be sidewalk licensed cafes catering for visitors and numbers of restaurants will stay open until 1.30am.

South Australia has always valued the "annual migration" from Broken Hill and we are determined to do all we can to provide proper facilities to see it continues.

The links between us have always been close and can be traced back to the arrival of the first miners from South Australia when the city was founded.

This has been expanded in recent times with the development of business contacts between the two cities, through sales of our products, and through mining research.

Another example is the affiliation of "The Barrier Miner" with "The News" in Adelaide and the annual production of this feature.

A small change in our State boundaries would have put Broken Hill formally inside South Australia.

But most of us look on the boundary as a technical distinction and that the people of Broken Hill are important and valued friends and partners in the development of South Australia.
