NORTH ADELAIDE PLAINS UNDERGROUND WATER.

Quota allocations on wells using North Adelaide Plains Underground water are to continue on the same basis as at present for the year from July 1, 1972, to June 30, 1973, the Premier and Mines Minister, Mr. Dunstan, announced today.

This follows a close study of the use and resources of the waters by the Underground Waters Advisory Committee.

The Premier expressed appreciation of the co-operation the Government had received from landholders in the defined area during the period of restriction.

Mr. Dunstan added that the Committee had warned that the ratio of withdrawal to replenishment of supplies remained at a ratio of five to one.

In view of this it seems certain that further reductions in the use of underground water will be necessary in future years.

Landholders should therefore not embark on any increased activity which relied on the availability of an adequate supply of water.
