PRESS RELEASE FROM THE PREMIER, MR. DUNSTAN

KANGAROO ISLAND BUSHFIRE

Special aid for Kangaroo Island farmers who lost stock and grazing in last week's huge bushfires was today approved by State Cabinet.

Details of the help to be provided to farmers affected were given by the Premier, Mr. Dunstan:

- . Grants for the purchase of hay and grain from last Thursday (February 6) to June 30.
- . Grants for the agistment of stock from last
 Thursday to June 30
- Transport of stock from the disaster area to agistment and return to be subsidised on a \$1 for \$1 basis.
- . Transport of fodder to be subsidised on a \$1 for \$1 basis. Fodder needed after July 1 next would be dealt with on an individual basis to be fixed at that time.
- Bushfire affected farmers will be eligible for a 50% rebate on the cost of freighting stock from Kangaroo Island to Adelaide by surface transport up to February 28.
- . Priority will be given to shipment of fencing materials to the Island.

Mr. Dunstan said Lands Department Inspectors on the Island had worked continuously to assess cosses and the immediate needs of farmers.
